	(1) Basic abilities as a researcher in the field of law.
	(2) Basic abilities as a quasi-legal professional.
	(3) Basic abilities as a highly developed professional.
Curriculum Policy	The curriculum of the Master's Course in the Graduate School of Law is comprised of the following elements, which serve to help students develop the basic abilities that they will need to be researchers, quasi-legal professionals, or advanced professionals:
	(1) Giving each student opportunities for consistent, ongoing, and individualized guidance under an advisor.
	(2) Providing students with ample resources for engaging with their own specializations at a deep level and meeting their individual interests on a broad scope.
Admission Policy	Students intending to enroll in the Master's Course in the Graduate School of Law are required to have an understanding of law or political science equivalent to that of a graduate of an undergraduate program in law. The Graduate School welcomes students who have a strong intellectual curiosity in their respective specializations, an interest in a wide range of academic disciplines, and a determination to contribute to society.

	Graduate School of Law (Doctoral Course)
	The Doctoral Course in the Graduate School of Law confers a doctoral degree in law on those who have been enrolled in the Doctoral Course for at least 3 years, passed the examination of a doctoral dissertation pertaining to their specialization under the guidance of an advisor, and developed either of the following abilities:
	(1) The ability to conduct independent, and self-motivated research in the field of law at a deep, probing level.
	(2) The ability to provide deep insight into the field of law in a practical setting.
Diploma Policy	
	The curriculum of the Doctoral Course in the Graduate School of Law is comprised of the following elements, which serve to help students develop the advanced abilities that they will need to be researchers or advanced professionals. These include:
	(1) Giving each student opportunities for consistent, ongoing, and individualized guidance under an advisor.
	(2) Providing students courses in their specialization and secondary fields in order to foster both broad and in-depth knowledge of their subject.
	Students intending to enroll in the Doctoral Course in the Graduate School of Law are required to have an understanding of law or political science equivalent to that of a graduate of a master's program in law. The Graduate School welcomes students who have a strong intellectual curiosity in their respective specializations and a determination to lay the foundation for contributions to both the nation and the world.
